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Course Description

What is the purpose of art? What does it mean to be an artist? What role does art play in my life? How do I interact with and access art? These may be some questions on your mind as you move through the world and as you enter this class. "When any civilization is dust and ashes, art is all that's left over. Images, words, music. Imaginative structures. Meaning—human meaning, that is—is defined by them" taken from Margaret Atwood's dystopian sci-fi novel *Oryz* & *Crake*. This course is an introduction to contemporary art and it's methods. We will explore weekly themes, writings, and artists to inspire discussion and response through the making of art objects.

Weekly workshops will skill-build practices of sculpture, drawing, painting, printmaking, photography, sound, and video, as well as make use of new media and collaboration via the maker's space and print labs. Art objects you create act as ideas that can be combined, reiterated, and reconstructed for an end of term final. In order to foster a community of artists, we will use constructive criticism, on a bi-weekly basis, to help better articulate work and provide feedback that is beneficial to fellow peers. There is a visual journal component to your class that will house and foster your art practice through daily and weekly prompts. As a collective, we will create a vulnerable yet safe space for both creative and intellectual curiosity.

The emphasis of the class is on a daily practice of process, choice, and momentum to empower you to feel confident and connected to your own making as a tool for thinking and communicating. From this class you will build a personal practice of reflection with both yourself and your community. This process of archiving, thinking, responding, inventing, communicating and problem-solving are useful tools for creativity you can apply to your future endeavors. My hope is you gain a better understanding of art and its vast and impactful purpose, and that you feel you can access its use moving forward.

Expectations

- * Punctual arrival to class * Arrive prepared to class with supply kit, journal, and devices
- * Phones & Devices on-task work only, off-task use will result in losing access to them during class
- * Work on assignments with thought and care * Turn in completed assignments on time
- * Push beyond your skill set / comfort zone * Make mistakes, fail forward
- * Ask questions and for help often * Be supportive of one another and share knowledge
- * Maintain complete portfolio with ALL work from entire course
- * Respect materials, equipment, the studio workspace, and artwork

Assessment & Grading

- You are required to complete weekly visual journal assignments, readings, and art object prompts to be submitted to Canvas on time each week. **Points will be deducted for late submissions unless an extension is requested.**
- Visual Journal entries are due throughout each week on canvas and are 30% of your grade. These are graded pass/fail unless you are missing part of the assignment (in which half credit is given).
- 40% of your final grade are Projects, they will be assessed based upon the following criteria: time and care put into the assignment, the level of experimental risk taken, the level of critical and creative thought reflected in the process, and the quality of craftsmanship. All projects may be revised and resubmitted for a higher grade up until the end of the term.
- 15% of your grade is your participation in the studio, this includes participating in class discussions, critiques and small group work as well as maintaining a clean work space, being mindful of shared supplies, and a supportive studiomate.
- Art 225 follows a pass/fail model- the line for passing is a 4: a 78 and above. A grade below 78 (or 1, 2, or 3) is failing.
